EQUALITY and DIVERSITY	We are committed to promoting equality in our work. All individuals are to be treated equally and be included in our work regardless of their religion, race, gender, identity, sexual orientation, education, language, culture, age or disability.
RESPECT and EMPOWERMENT	We will consult and work collaboratively with our members, partners and donors in achieving our goals.
SIGN LANGUAGE and COMMUNITY	Language rights are essential for deaf people's human rights, thus sign languages and Deaf Communities must be legally recognised and promoted.
LEADERSHIP of DEAF PEOPLE	Deaf organisations must be led by deaf people and decisions which affect deaf people need to be made by deaf people.

## WFD GUIDING PRINCIPLES

HUMAN RIGHTS BASED APPROACH	<ul> <li>The principles and objectives of the United Nations (UN) Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights including the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and other general acts and recommendations of the UN and its specialised agencies guide WFD's work.</li> <li>The WFD operates in line with the philosophy of "Leave No One Behind", meaning equalisation of opportunities and full participation in society for deaf people in every country.</li> </ul>
RESPECT FOR LINGUSTIC DIVERSITY	• The WFD works on an ongoing basis for the recognition of sign languages as part of linguistic diversity and aims to improve the status of national sign languages.
INCLUSIVE AND ACCESSIBLE SOCIETY	<ul> <li>The WFD believes no deaf person should be denied quality education in their national sign language(s) and that parents and providers of education should implement bilingual education for deaf children.</li> <li>The WFD works for an accessible society with no barriers where services and information are available in sign languages.</li> </ul>
LEADERSHIP OF DEAF PEOPLE	<ul> <li>The WFD promotes the principle: "Nothing about us without us".</li> <li>The WFD believes that the establishment and strengthening of national deaf associations will contribute to the autonomy, expertise and self-determination of deaf communities.</li> </ul>
CO-OPERATION AND PARTNERSHIP	<ul> <li>The WFD engages with its member organisations and other stakeholders such as organisations of persons with disabilities, the UN and its agencies and programmes, donors, and universities to successfully undertake its work.</li> </ul>
